During my first year as President of South Mountain Community College, I set out on what I called at the time a "listening tour" of the campus. This was an effort to talk with our stakeholders, including students, employees, educational and business partners, and, of course, the surrounding community. I wanted to ensure that we begin to move forward in a deliberate, strategic way to overcome any obstacles that might be in our path, and to move the college from surviving to thriving.

One of the key things I also discovered this first year was the absolute dedication of the faculty and staff at SMCC. These are people who love this college and this community and are working tirelessly to make a difference in the lives of the students we serve.








In 2022, SMCC students completed the national Noel-Levitz Student Satisfaction Inventory (SSI) survey to rate their college satisfaction. The survey results showed SMCC students are more likely to have their expectations met and more likely to re-enroll when compared to students at other two-year institutions.

Student satisfaction assessments are a key indicator of the current institutional environment. The data from the Noel -Levitz Satisfaction Inventory (SSI) provides direction for improving the quality of student life and learning in the areas that are most important to our students.

The survey measures student satisfaction and importance, showing both how satisfied students are in their college experience and what experiences are important to them. The results support institutional efforts by identifying potential next steps the college can implement to effectively respond to student concerns.

SMCC SOFTBALL WINS REGION I DIVISION II CHAMPIONSHIP AND EARN THEIR SPOT AT THE NJCAA DII WORLD SERIES O23 NJCAA REGIO

The South Mountain Community College (SMCC) softball team's 2023 season was nothing short of historic. The Cougars embarked on a remarkable journey, marked by championship moments and thrilling victories, ultimately earning them a coveted spot in the NJCAA Division II World Series in Spartanburg, S.C.

With an impressive record of 52-8, the SMCC Softball team won all three of their games at the Region I Division II Tournament, securing the Region Championship and a ticket to the NJCAA Division II World Series held at Tyger River Park in Spartanburg, SC.

The Cougars concluded the season with an outstanding record of 54-10, setting a new school record for wins. They not only claimed the ACCAC Title outright but also made history by hosting the Region I Division II Tournament for the first time.

As the season wrapped up, the program announced the transfers of six talented student-athletes to four-year universities, further showcasing the team's commitment to player development. Additionally, Head Coach Matta accepted the Associate Head Coach position at the University of Texas-El Paso, marking a significant transition for the program.

The 2023 SMCC softball season was a testament to the team's unwavering dedication and resilience, leaving an indelible mark on the program's history. The Cougars have not only celebrated victory on the field but also paved the way for their future success.

MADISON CADDEN NAMED SMCC CLASS OF 2023 VALEDICTORIAN



Madison Cadden has been on the volleyball court since she was a 12-year old fourth grader, and throughout her elementary, high school, and college education, Cadden thrived as both an athlete and a student who is focused and willing to go beyond.

Originally from the East Valley in Queen Creek and Gilbert, Arizona, she first became interested in sports when she saw her mom as both a coach and referee. After choosing volleyball as her sport, her athletic career took her on a journey of competition, friendship, and discipline.

A high school graduate of Mesquite High, her love of sciences and connection with the volleyball coaches and staff helped her choose South Mountain Community College for her college education.

"I saw my coaches as mentors," Cadden said. "They supported me and advisor, supported me and my priorities as a student while still helping me succeed on the volleyball court."

Becoming an athlete and a pre-nursing major was a challenge, requiring her to be disciplined and dedicated to succeeding in all aspects of her career.

"It was a challenge to choose a career as demanding as pre-nursing as well as being a college athlete; I had to learn time management quickly," Cadden said. "My career path has always been to help others and becoming a Nurse Practitioner felt like the right choice for me at the time."

In the Fall of 2022, Cadden earned Second Team All-AACCAC honors and received a place on the All-Region I Division II Team. She was also an Honors Program student and a recipient of the President's Honor Scholarship, covering her full-time tuition, and earned an athletic scholarship that helped her cover books and additional college costs. Cadden was also a Phi Theta Kappa member during her time at SMCC. All programs she was part of required her to maintain a high GPA.

Cadden was an outstanding student who dedicated herself to her team, her studies and supporting other students. She was a math tutor in the Learning Resource Center, helping students pass their classes. She also accomplished all of this while holding a job in a clinic as part of her clinical experience.

This Spring of 2023, Cadden decided to change her career path altogether, surprising her coaches, teammates, and family. After spending most of her college education following a pre-nursing path, she chose to pursue a career with Allegiant Airlines to become a pilot.

"I went to a Women in Aviation meeting that inspired me to join," Cadden shared. "There aren't many women who are pilots, and after I researched and learned about the career, I went on my trial flight and fell in love with it."

The Allegiant Pilot Pathway Program is approximately three years, during which she will spend training to fly, instruct new pilots, and then co-pilot.

"I assessed the pros and cons when I was making my decision, and now I'm just super excited to make an impact as a woman in a male-dominated field," Cadden said. "Everything I experienced here, from tutoring to being a disciplined athlete and student, has prepared me for this. I know communication will be key in succeeding as a pilot."

Cadden graduated on May 11 during Commencement with an Associate of Arts in General Studies. She is proud to be the Class of 2023 Valedictorian after she believed her chances were lower after changing her major and choosing to not pursue a university degree right after community college.

Her parents and five sisters, teammates and coaches are proud to see her dedication paid off. After graduation, she began her flying training in August, 2023 along with her sister in Colorado.

"My change came very sudden, but after learning more about the career, I am focused and ready for this new journey," Cadden said.

She hopes to be an example for her graduating class by inspiring others to follow their dreams.

"Don't settle; the sky is the limit," Cadden said. "Literally for me."

Arizona community colleges are entering a new era as Senate Bill 1453, signed into law by former Governor Doug Ducey, granted them the authority to offer four-year baccalaureate degrees. This groundbreaking decision aims to enhance access, affordability, and educational opportunities in Arizona, marking a historic moment for students and their families.

In a historic decision announced by Dr. Steven Gonzalez, Chancellor for the Maricopa County Community Colleges District (MCCCD), SMCC was selected as one of the colleges to offer a four-year degree program. SMCC was selected to offer a Bachelor of Science (BS) in Behavioral Sciences. This initiative, authorized by the MCCCD Governing Board, represents a significant leap forward in higher education.

The launch of the Bachelor of Science in Behavioral Sciences at SMCC has been an overwhelming success, with students showing remarkable enthusiasm and dedication. The program's unique blend of high-quality education and a strong focus on practical applications has resonated with aspiring professionals in this field.

As a result, the college is delighted to announce that for Fall 2023, the program is currently at full capacity, a testament to the demand and popularity in our community.

Hermanas translates to "sisters," a term chosen to emphasize sisterhood, in the experience of learning together and connecting with successful women in STEM fields.

The conference program exposed students to the college campus and the new SMCC Science Complex, where they toured and had a chance to join workshops for Encryption and Decoding, Geology with Crystal Investigation, Life Sciences with Eyes on the World of Science and Discovery, Math and a workshop in Engineering Duct Tape Design. The conference also welcomed keynote speaker and SMCC Math Faculty member Dr. Dolores Urbieta, as well as SMCC President Dr. Richard Daniel








The SMCC "See Yourself in STEM" Conference Created Memorable Experiences for Hundreds of High School Students

SMCC Teams Up with ASU to Bring Advanced Math Opportunities to Students

SMCC Professor Bechir Amdouni and ASU Professor Dr. Malena Español joined forces to introduce higher level mathematics to a group of students from both institutions. The year-long endeavor culminated in a joint research presentation during the Mathematical Association of America (MAA) Southwestern Section Conference held in El Paso, TX. Through the Center for Undergraduate Reach in Mathematics (CURM) grant, each student earned \$3,000 for their contributions.



SMCC students Leslie Millan, Mariana Godinez Pedraza, and Fernando Robles, along with four ASU students, delved into mathematics concepts and expanded their knowledge in fields such as linear algebra, numerical linear algebra, programming (Matlab), and Latex. They embarked on joint research projects, including image deblurring for various scientific applications and enhancing the Thermal Emission Imaging System (THEMIS) on the Mars Odyssey spacecraft.

The collaborative team of seven students presented their research at the MAA conference in April 2023, showcasing their dedication and achievements. This remarkable opportunity exposed SMCC students to advanced math concepts, opening doors to exciting career prospects. Funded by the National Science Foundation, CURM grants provide invaluable support for undergraduate research groups, helping students overcome obstacles and pursue their academic aspirations.

SMCC and Heard Museum Team Up to Honor Native American Culture with Weaving Class

SMCC's American Indian Student Center partnered with the Heard Museum to offer a four-day weaving class, celebrating indigenous art and culture during the Summer 2023. This unique opportunity connected students, staff, and the community to traditional weaving skills, fostering intergenerational relationships and honoring ancient traditions.

Fifteen students of all ages gathered to learn and create, bridging the gap between generations. The week-long class immersed participants in Native American culture, equipping them with the skills to weave their own patterns using traditional tools and techniques.

This partnership aims to provide meaningful programs that celebrate culture, inspire learning, and strengthen the South Phoenix community.

The nationally recognized and highly competitive Bellwether Award identifies and honors outstanding and innovative community college programs in three award categories. Only 10 submissions from community colleges across the country are selected to compete in each of the three categories, for a total of 30 nationwide submissions.
